

How to find Audience Targeting of any Facebook Ad?


A very simple technique that will unveil the targeting behind any ad.

Select any Random Ad

Go to Facebook and randomly view any Ad or Sponsored Post you see.



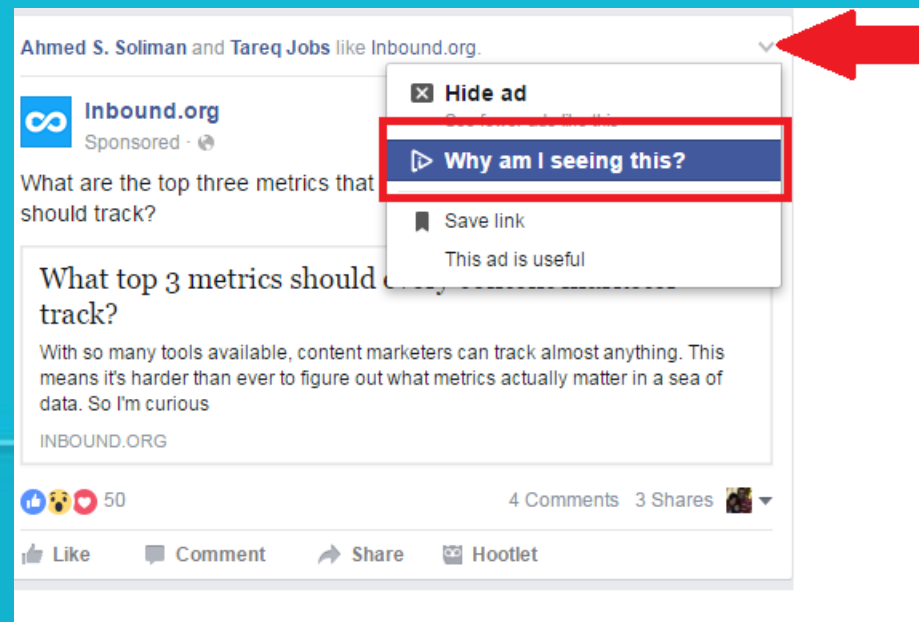
